

# IMMEDIATE RELEASE SANTA CRUZ-WATSONVILLE METROPOLITAN STATISTICAL AREA (MSA) (Santa Cruz County)

The unemployment rate in the Santa Cruz County was 8.4 percent in February 2021, down from a revised 8.7 percent in January 2021, and above the year-ago estimate of 6.4 percent. This compares with an unadjusted unemployment rate of 8.4 percent for California and 6.6 percent for the nation during the same period.

WDB Business Services Manager Peter Detlefs noted that his department was working on a marketing and communications bid and continues to work on the State of the Workforce Report. Also monitoring funding for the small business grant.

WDB Director Andy Stone gave an update on the latest unemployment figures from EDD, for August 2020. WDB Business Services Manager Peter Detlefs noted during his report that the Santa Cruz County unemployment rate for December 2020 was 8.5%, up from a revised 6.8% in November 2020 and above the year ago estimate of 4.8%. This compared with an unadjusted unemployment rate of 8.8% for California and 6.5% for the nation during the same period.

They are all still waiting on the revolving loan funds to be available.
